Deep Creek is unusual in suburban Sydney in having a flood plain that retains its natural vegetation, never having been cleared for housing or agriculture. It features an unusual and interesting mix of wetland and rainforest species, and is a popular area with birdwatchers.

The walk is easy to moderate in grade and follows the flood plain upstream from tidal inlet to a small, rocky side valley with waterfalls.

Most of you will be aware of the ancient volcanic activity of the Sydney Basin through the special vegetation communities that the dykes, intrusions and diatremes support. This is strikingly different to the surrounding sandstone flora. and usually features some mesic or rainforest species such as cabbage tree palms not normally found on sandstone soils. Some of you will have seen such vegetation at West Head on last year's STEP spring bushwalk, and briefly examined the small outcrop of weathered dolerite intrusive in the nearby road cutting.

Our district is well endowed with diatremes: at Browns Field, in the Muogomarra area, and of course the Hornsby Diatreme in Old Mans Valley on the west side of Hornsby.

For our first talk this year, we are lucky to have Dr David Roots, to describe and illuminate the past violent volcanic events from our area by comparing them with examples from active volcanic terrains in East Asia that he has visited. David currently lectures in geology at UTS, and contributed the section on the Hornsby Diatreme in the *Berowra Valley Bushland Guide*.

# Talk: Australian Brush Turkeys, our Urban Wanderers

In recent years brush turkeys have been showing up more and more in suburban bushland and even in back yards in Ku-ring-gai and adjoining areas. They belong to the family known as megapodes, which also includes the mallee fowl. They are large, conspicuous, mainly solitary birds. The male builds large mounds of decaying vegetation in which the eggs are incubated by the heat of decomposition. The favoured habitat is rainforest and adjoining eucalypt forest and woodland, but they are increasingly becoming familiar as urban wanderers.

Dr Ann Goeth from Macquarie University will present this talk.

## **Environmental Education**

In September, STEP offered a grant of \$2,250 to primary schools in Ku-ring-gai to help them implement their School Environmental Management Plan (see *STEP Matters*, Issue 129). This plan is required by all state schools under the Environmental Education Policy and is the driver of environmental education.

The plans are based on three areas:

- curriculum (teaching environment through the Key Learning Areas);
- use of resources (such as water, power, paper); and
- management of the school grounds.

STEP offered the grant over three years for a proposal which would assist the school with either the management of the grounds or with the better use of resources. St Ives Park Primary was the successful school with its *Environmental Awareness and Ecogarden Project*. The school has remnant bush and has formed a Bushcare group under guidance from Ku-ring-gai Council. STEP will meet with the school to advise and determine how the money will be spent.

This will be a really worthwhile project, as it will be encouraging children to appreciate and care for their local bushland and its wildlife.

# Draft Plan of Management for Bushlands in Ku-ring-gai and Draft Biodiversity Strategy

STEP has made submissions on Ku-ring-gai Council's *Draft Plan* of *Management for Bushlands in Ku-ring-gai* and their *Draft Biodiversity Strategy* which have recently been out for comment.

It is worth noting that serious concerns were expressed about the Draft Biodiversity Strategy and a thorough revision was suggested. The preparation of the document appears to be very formulaic, there is some confusion of language, and there are some omissions, e.g. the role of Ku-ring-gai nursery to counter genetic erosion by producing local provenance stock and the threat posed by inappropriate fire regimes. It also omits listing some of the ecological communities present in Ku-ring-gai, thereby falling short of providing a strategy to protect these communities.

In general it was felt that the document does not do justice to the biodiversity in Ku-ring-gai, on which the community places high importance as expressed in the 2004 environmental survey and acknowledged in the document itself.
